### ANSWERS to CATHOLIC IQ

- **1. a)** St. Jerome (347–420 AD) gave us the first Latin Bible translation, known as *The Vulgate*. He is the patron of librarians. His feast day is September 26.
- **2. d)** Moses appointed Joshua as his successor to lead the Israelites into the Promised Land (Deuteronomy 31:7).
- **3. c)** St. Teresa of Avila (1515–1582 AD) wrote *The Interior Castle*, describing how to grow closer to God through contemplative prayer. Her feast day is October 15.
- **4. b)** St. Francis (1182–1226 AD) founded the Franciscan order. He is a patron saint of the environment, and his feast day is October 4.
- **5. d)** St. Paul persecuted the earliest Christians until his conversion. He was beheaded for his faith in Christ. The patron saint of missionaries, his feast day is June 29.
- **6. True.** St. Anthony (1195–1231 AD) came from a rich Portuguese family but rejected wealth to serve the poor as a Franciscan. Known as the patron saint of lost things, his feast day is June 13.
- **7. c)** Along with St. Paul, St. Peter, the first pope, is considered the most important of Christ's earliest disciples. His feast day is June 29, the same as St. Paul's.
- **8. a)** St. Augustine (354–430 AD) was the most influential theologian in Catholicism until St. Thomas Aquinas in the 1200s. He is the patron saint of theologians. We celebrate his feast day on August 28.
- **9. False.** That name came from her self-description as "the little flower of Jesus," unnoticed by the world but growing and giving glory to God. She is the patron saint of the Gardens of Vatican City. Her feast is October 1.
- **10. b)** The teaching of St. Irenaeus (130–202 AD) echoed Christ's words: "I have come so that they might have life to the full" (John 10:10). His feast day is June 28.

- **11. d)** St. Pius X (1835–1914 AD) moved the reception of First Communion to the age of reason, approximately second grade in the United States. Known as the Pope of the Blessed Sacrament, and patron of first communicants, August 21 is his feast day.
- **12. c)** St. Pio of Pietrelcina, familiar to many as "Padre Pio." It is said he had a gift of reading souls, and could miraculously appear in two places at once. A patron saint of teenagers, his feast day is September 23.
- **13.** a) Venerable Fulton Sheen (1895–1979 AD) is considered the first TV evangelist.
- **14. a)** St. Thomas Aquinas (1225–1274 AD) used reason to explain Christianity, including his five proofs for the existence of God. A patron saint of academics, his feast day is January 28.
- **15. True.** St. John Paul II explained how true freedom leads to greatness in virtue.
- **16. d)** St. Catherine had mystical visions of Jesus and is a doctor of the Church. She is a patron saint of Italy with a feast day of April 29.
- **17. b)** Originally a military soldier, St. Ignatius (1491–1556 AD) became a soldier for Christ after reading the biographies of several saints. The patron saint of soldiers, his feast day is July 31.
- **18.** a) St. Maria Goretti (1890–1902 AD) was stabbed 14 times when she refused the sexual advances of her attacker. On her deathbed, she forgave him. He converted in jail when Maria visited him in a vision. She is a patron saint of crime victims. July 6 is her feast day.
- **19. d)** St. Ambrose preached that God gave to all equally: If the poor had too little, it meant someone had taken too much and must return it. He is a patron saint of bishops and police, with a feast day on December 7.
- **20. True.** For Augustine, loving God and being loved by God was better than anything the world had to offer. So if you truly loved God, you would only do good things.

- **1. b)** During the Wedding at Cana, the wine ran out. When Mary asked Jesus to help, he performed his first miracle (John 2:1–11).
- **2. a)** In his peace prayer, St. Francis (1182–1226 AD) asked God to help him bring love where there was hatred and forgiveness to people who were hurt by others. Patron saint of the environment. Feast Day: October 4.
- **3. d)** St. Thomas was one of Jesus' twelve disciples, but he didn't believe Jesus resurrected until Jesus appeared and showed Thomas his wounds. Jesus said to him: "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed" (John 20:26–29). Patron saint of India. Feast Day: July 3.
- **4. a)** St. Patrick (387-461 AD) was abducted as a child by Irish pirates and sold into slavery in Ireland. After escaping years later, God called him to return to Ireland to share Christ with them. Patron saint of Ireland. Feast Day: March 17.
- **5. c)** Jesus forgave Peter for denying him and made him the first leader (Pope) of the Church (Matthew 16:13–18). Patron saint of fishermen. Feast Day: June 29.
- **6. c)** King David wrote most of the Psalms and is described in Scripture as "a man after God's own heart" (1 Samuel 13:14).
- **7. a)** God spoke to Moses from the burning bush and told him to lead the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt (Exodus 2–14).
- **8. d)** Mother Teresa (1910–1997 AD) served Jesus in the "distressing disguise of the poor." Feast Day: September 5.
- **9. b)** Millions visit the shrine where Mary appeared in Lourdes to pray for miracles and healing. St. Bernadette (1844–1879 AD) is the patron saint of the physically ill. Feast Day: April 16.
- **10. c)** St. John the Baptist paved the way for Jesus, the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world. Once Jesus came, John stepped aside, saying: "He must increase, I must decrease" (John 3:30). Patron saint of Puerto Rico. Feast Day: June 24.
